



The colors of gold, red, yellow, and orange soon will burst out of the ground at the Peace Garden in Oswego.

The garden, which commemorates peace between the United States and Canada, was planted May 26 with marigolds, zinnias, geraniums and Canis. Called the Oswego War of 1812 Bicentennial Peace Garden, the site overlooks the Oswego River on East First Street just south of the Oswego school district education center.

City Engineer Anthony Leotta said the garden is a joint project of the city and Oswego County and is part of the 600-mile War of 1812 Bicentennial Peace Garden Trail that stretches from Sackets Harbor west and into Canada commemorating places key to War of 1812 history.
